



10 Willersley House Built by Major J.G. Smithson in 1906. Originally called Ivy Cottage, it took its name from the much older property, built in the early 1700s, which, partially, remains in the grounds. Willersley House is now a residential home for the elderly.

11 Camp's Corner William Camp tended his market garden here until 1989.

12 The Beeches Called The Summer House in earlier times, the house was built in 1730 by Raspin Norrison, yeoman of Willerby. The house has now been divided into a number of luxury apartments.

19 The Redwoods

13 White House Close This was the former site of White House Farm. Latterly a dairy farm, Frank Humble was its final tenant. The farmhouse was demolished in the late 1980s.

14 Grange Farm dates from around 1800. It is now a private residence. Look out for the names of local brickmakers in the wall of the mews next door.

15 Willerby Grange/Mercure Hotel Built as a residence for Richard Willows, a silk merchant around 1890, the house became a hotel during the 1960s. Large extensions have all but obscured the original building.

16 Castle Gardens Dahlias and other flowers were grown on a large plot behind this house by the Keith family. These were popular with local flower arrangers.

17 Victoria Avenue Roman and medieval artefacts were found in 1912 in a garden along here.

1 Willerby & Kirk Ella Railway Station The station opened in 1884 on completion of the Hull & Barnsley Railway. When the line closed in 1966 the station was demolished. **Kingston Rise** now stands on the site.

2 Shops at Willerby Square Built in the 1930s, the shops are now dominated by estate agents' offices. As late as the 1960s there were several grocers, a greengrocer and a butcher.

3 Alma Cottage was built around 1840. Initially a house, it became a bank in 1947. The bank closed in 2021

4 Victoria Terrace dates from the 1890s. At one time, No. 2 was the local telephone exchange and Nos. 8 & 10 a doctors' surgery.

5 Kingsley Drive A dairy farm once stood here, known as Whyte Farm. In the 1930s, it was replaced by a row of shops and Kingsley Drive.

6 Conservative Office. Harrison's Store was here in the 1920s. Before its current use, it was a meeting hall for social events, known as The Studio.

7 Willerby Industry Bee-hives and caravans were once made on land to the west of Main Street.

8 Willerby & Kirk Ella Parish Institute is a former farmhouse built around 1750 and renovated in the 1830s. The house was gifted to the community in 1922 for use for educational and recreational purposes. The building now houses Willerby Library.

9 The Star Inn Built in 1906 by Hull Breweries, it replaced a much older inn which had been run by the Richardson family since the 1840s.

18 Great Gutter Lane A watercourse or drain once ran alongside the road, hence, its current name.

19 Willerby Hall This house was built by William Mowld, a Hull merchant, in the early 18th century. Its final resident was John Henry Fisher, a timber merchant. After his death in 1937, the house was eventually converted in to a number of apartments.

20 Glenholme Dating from the late 19th century, this was the home of Charles Fisher, brother of Charles Henry of Willerby Hall. Two of his daughters died at the house in a tragic fire in 1974.

21 Manor Cottage and Manor Gate Lodge Said to have been built in 1837, these two cottages became part of the Willerby Manor estate after the latter was built for John Fisher, a timber merchant, in the 1870s. A hotel since the 1960s, Willerby Manor was demolished in 2022.

22 Savoy Autocentre Originally built by Samuel Binnington around 1920 to house his fleet of buses, it eventually became a garage and filling station prior to its current use.

23 Milton House The original detached residence was built in the 1890s by Frederick Thompson, a builder. The house has undergone successive transformations and now contains a number of flats.

24 Former Methodist Church and School Now a private residence, the church was built in 1897 to replace an earlier chapel on Main Street. It closed in 1966 when a new church was built across the road in Carr Lane.
